Downtown Library Hosts Author Patricia Henley



Patricia Henley—author of six books—speaks at 7 p.m., Thursday, April 1, at the downtown library.

Patricia Henley's first visit to a library at age five, an outing with her grandmother, launched a lifelong love of reading and writing.

"I brought home stack after stack of library books and read late into the night," says Henley. "My childhood was spent reading and figuring out how to garner more time for reading."

A Tree Grows in Brooklyn and *The Secret Garden* were two favorites. "With their heroines who heal and grow, they are perhaps the most influential books of my childhood."

While Henley wrote poems and stories at a young age, "I never dreamed of being a writer." She was the eldest in a family of eight children. "We were poor and it was not practical," she says.

But write and publish she has, as well as teach. A graduate of the MFA program

at John Hopkins University, Henley has been a professor of English at Purdue since 1987. She's published two novels—one was a finalist for the National Book Award, three short story collections and a book of poetry.

Henley speaks at the downtown library at 7 p.m., Thursday, April 1. Her topic is "What a Long, Strange Trip It's Been: Writing Out of the Midwest."

Henley's writing frequently reflects her Midwestern background and her sense of place, whether that place is her Indiana home or her travels to Central America.

As you receive this newsletter, my tenure at the Tippecanoe County Public Library will have reached a two-year milestone. Not

much time, especially compared to several staff members who have worked for this organization more than 20 years. Their dedication is admirable, their longevity commendable, and they are wonderful assets of the library. However, my thoughts today are not focused on singling them out nor will my thoughts reflect on my two-year

perspective of TCPL as an organization. Instead, I would like to write about one of the most delightful, encouraging and supportive aspects of the library. The real problem is I don't know what term to use to identify it. Well, here goes.

Without hesitation, I can confidently say there are more people/institutions supporting TCPL than any other library I have worked in. This is a highly supported community library. When it comes to talent, Neil Waldman can claim both the visual and literary arts. He's created postage stamps for thirteen countries, illustrated dozens of children's books and written many of his own.

It's no surprise that as a child, his favorite activity was time in his room with crayons and a sketch pad. He graduated from the Rochester Institute of Technology and spent the next 25 years as a freelance artist and author. Today, Waldman teaches art at the State University of New York.

A Bit About Seuss

Theodor Seuss Geisel was born March 2, 1904, in Springfield, Mass. He graduated from Dartmouth College in 1925 and then worked in advertising.

After 27 publishers rejected it, his first book, *And To Think That I Saw It on Mulberry Street*, was published in 1937. He won the Pulitzer Prize in 1984 and three Academy Awards. He died in 1991.

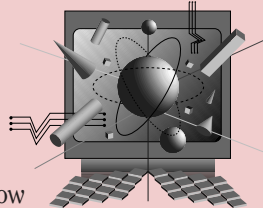
