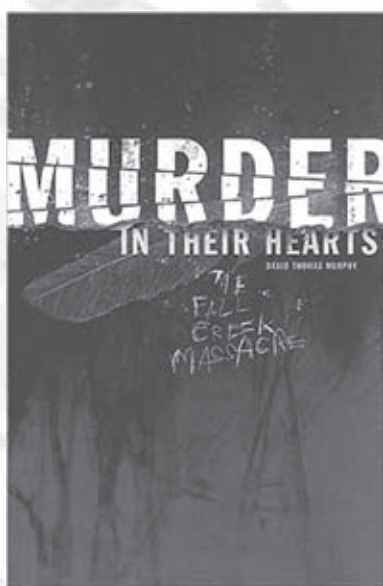

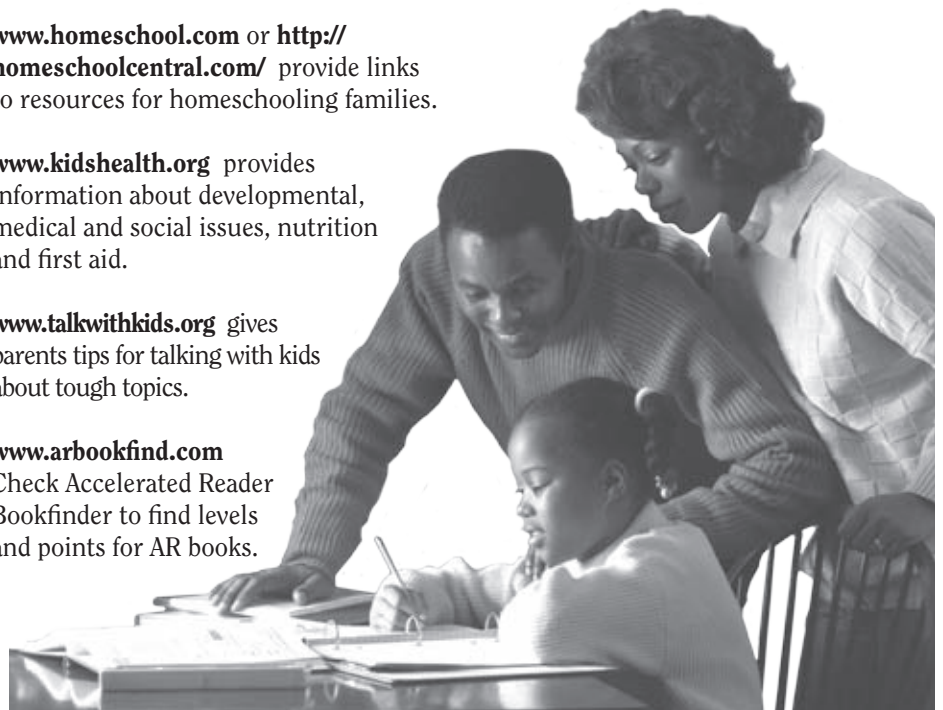

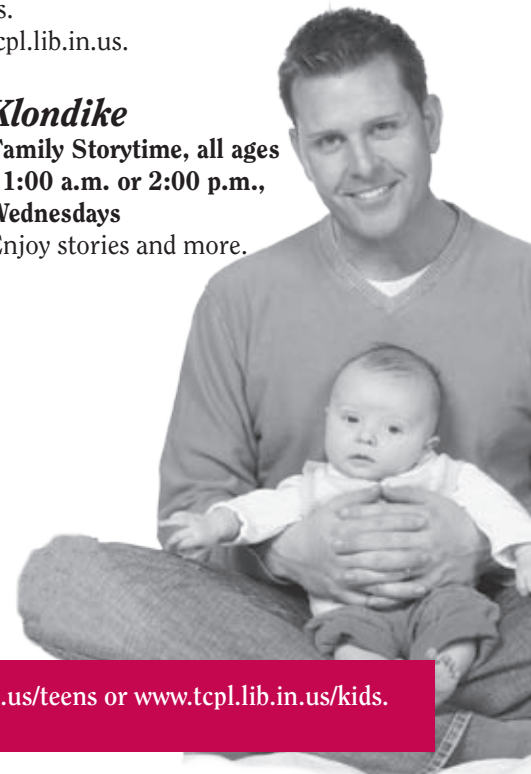

# Social Media & Mobile/Outreach

Recently, my thoughts turned to the world of social media and its daily use in social networking. I began to evaluate my approach

to and use of social media in my personal and professional interactions. Until now, I confidently and conscientiously announced my limited involvement in and use of social media. Insufficient time to consistently use social media and my sense of seeing other people constantly using it were my justifications. Now, I ask myself how much longer I can avoid full engagement in these popular and obviously efficient technological tools? Why ask? The timing of two distinct activities raised this question.

First, you may have noticed the Campus Library offered training sessions involving social media – Facebook, Flickr, LinkedIn, and Twitter – in July. Not surprisingly, these sessions were well-attended. Staff presenters received positive comments about their preparation for the sessions and the trainings as well. Evaluations also showed participants requested longer sessions. This information suggests library users will welcome and benefit from more social media sessions.

Second, we decided to ensure all staff are more keenly aware of social media and its uses. To that end, the library is embarking on an online training program with multiple staff modules. The title is “TCPL’s 23 Things.” It is a staff-developed activity (partially adapted from other libraries) that offers the opportunity to explore the newer web-based tools in a self-paced, self-discovery mode. “TCPL’s 23 Things” is formatted as an Internet-based blog. In an online-environment, staff will learn about new technologies and how they increasingly impact the way the world accesses, creates, preserves, and communicates information.

Entering this world of podcasts, wikis, image generators, RSS feeds, and blogging will be fun and challenging for all library staff. These exercises will enhance our knowledge, aid library administration in planning future service initiatives and resource allocations, and best of all, improve our ability to assist you.

Back to my personal journey: where am I in this ever evolving world of social media? Can I still hold out and use just a little bit here and there? I have to admit I really want to hold out! But it seems it will not be so. Why? Primarily, because there is an ever-increasing expectation that I “get with it” and use social media personally and professionally. Secondly, I am a staff member and expected to fully participate in “TCPL’s 23 Things.” Already the discovery exercises and “hands on applications” have exposed me to manipulating images online, creating YouTube playlists, and participating in podcasting. I will create my own blog and invite others to participate in it. Direct use of these trendy web tools is increasing my interest and enabling me to see how useful social media/networking can be.

How about you? Are you engaged in social media and networking? Is it occasionally daunting or just so much fun you overlook the challenges associated with it? Are you using social media in combination with your library experiences? Do you anticipate we will integrate social media in our collection and resources?

I don’t have all the answers to these questions, but I believe social media technologies may become essential to successful libraries. I also know these new media are valued for their convenience and instantaneous feedback and expectations for quality service include these elements. I imagine social media and networking will impact libraries of the future and expand my personal horizons. I look forward to learning new skills and finding ways social media serve you, and all library customers. I just hope we all have fun along the way!

When some people hear “memorials,” they imagine organ music and THE END. But some gifts (a.k.a., memorials) create thousands of new beginnings. Imagine a shower gift multiple generations of babies could enjoy or a class reunion gift that celebrates a whole community.

Over 100 years ago, James J. Perrin, a Lafayette school trustee, donated \$10,000 for the purchase of books for what was then known as the Lafayette Public Library. According to the October 16, 1881 Sunday Leader of Lafayette:

*“Mr. Perrin could have placed this interest money in his pocket if he had desired to do so, for the courts had decided that there was no legal obligation resting on him to pay it over. He preferred to place it where it would do the most good; and that was in the advancement of the education of the children of Lafayette. In the years to come, when this library shall have grown into greater proportions, the name of James J. Perrin will be mentioned in words of loudest praise.”*

Imagination—just what we always wanted! Thanks for the gift, Mr. Perrin.

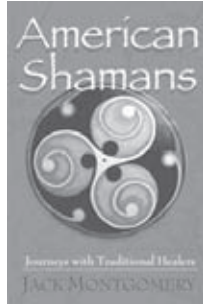

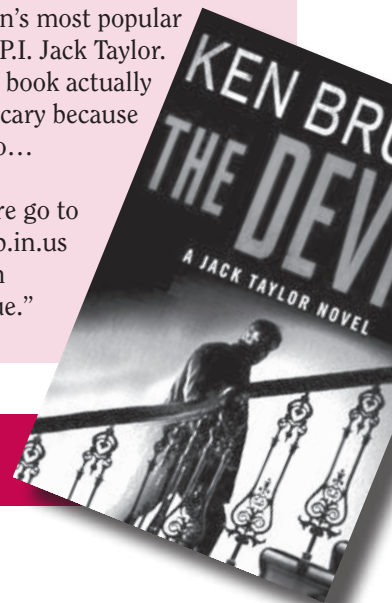

“Increasing numbers of e-books, audio books, and videos are now available via [www.tcpl.lib.in.us](http://www.tcpl.lib.in.us),” said TCPL Head Technology Librarian Neal Starkey. “You can select everything from biographies to science fiction to films, use a variety of devices, and even place holds.”

“People who received e-readers as gifts kept us busy in early 2011,” said Head Reference Librarian Alison Moss. “Customers were eager to download TCPL items to their e-readers and new computers. We were happy to help.”

Like print items, downloadables are copyrighted and may be checked out with a TCPL library card. Your library, in consortium with other Indiana libraries, purchases downloadables from Overdrive®, a leading global digital media provider.
